The associate degree nurse is assumed to have competence in microbiology, anatomy, physiology, nutrition, introductory psychology and sociology, life-span human development and behavior, and communication skills, as well as basic nursing competence. Coursework in these areas is required as part of the Associate Degree in Nursing curriculum at Kirkwood. Students are encouraged to speak with an advisor in the College of Nursing if there are deficits in any of these areas.
